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Preface

The College founded in the year 1964, M. P. E. Society's, S. D. M. College of Arts, Science, Commerce, BBA and Post Graduate Studies in Commerce and General Chemistry a Grant-in aid co-educational College celebrated its Golden Jubilee in the year 2015. It is one of the three educational institutions managed by Malnad Progressive Education Society (Regd) Honavar, Uttara Kannada. The college which was named as M. P., E. Society's Degree College in the year 1964 and was renamed as S. D.M. Arts, Science and Commerce College in the year 1974. This was the turning point in the history of this college since then it has become a house hold name all over the district by acquiring excellent academic standards and achieved a unique recognition among the institutes of Higher education in the state. The college is located in a rural setting surrounded on one side by a natural reserve forest named as Sahyadri Mountain series provided a lush green ambience and on the other Arabian Sea providing a beautiful beach. The college has a sprawling campus area of 50 acres which it shares with sister institutions managed by the M. P. E. Society. The college is affiliated to Karnatak University, Dharwad. The college is recognized under section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act 1956. The college was accredited by NAAC at 'A' in the first cycle (2004) and repeated its performance in the second cycle by getting Re-accredited at 'A' (2011). Thus, the college acquired uniqueness in the district for having secured 'A' grade at two consecutive times by the NAAC. Being one of the premier institutes in the District over the period of more than fifty years of its existence, achieved its objective of providing higher education to those who aspire for it among the rural folk. Exemplary performance of the students of the college in curricular and co-curricular activities and the high position occupied by the alumni of the institution speak volumes about the genuine interest and sincere endeavors of the institute in fostering dormant talents and tapping creative and innovative spirit of students. With its rare blend of heritage and modernity and excellent infrastructure and human resources, the college is in forefront in developing global skills in the learners to pursue its mission of 'empowering of youth to make higher education the fulcrum of sociocultural change'.



IQAC

Soon after the first cycle of accreditation, IQAC was formally formed in 2005 and it has developed several quality assurance mechanisms within the existing academic and administrative system and support services. It envisions Total Quality Management for quality administrative activities of the institution. It supports the organization of the workshops, seminars, awareness programmes, extension lectures, planning and implementation of advanced research activities, co-curricular activities and also contributes to the empowerment of the staff and the governance patterns in strategic planning. Executive Summary





CRITERION I : CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The college follows the syllabi prescribed by Karnatak University, Dharwad. A few of our senior faculty members are on the BoS/Text Book Committe of the University and contribute in curricular design. The institution has developed its own curriculum for different Add-on skill based certificate/Diploma courses which are complementary to the curriculum of University. Teachers attend the orientation programmes organized by the university from time to time to transact the syllabi. Individual teachers prepare a detailed plan of teaching for each semester basing themselves on the calendar of events of the institution. Term plan and lecture plan are recorded in the teacher's diary which is verified by the HOD and the Principal periodically. Additionally, departments have internal systems for workload allocation, taking stock of progress of mid-semester moderation of internal assessment and reviewing student performance.

Academic flexibility

The institution offers B.A, B.Sc and B.Com courses which are aided and BBA, M.Com and M.Sc in General Chemistry are unaided courses. Subject combinations as per the stipulation of the government and the University, restrict the horizontal mobility and the inter-disciplinary options. However, the loss is made up by the college by offering three add-on courses as supplementary enrichment initiative. These courses are sponsored by UGC curriculum enrichment.

Curriculum enrichment initiatives are on the priority of the college. The college extends all support for the field visits, industrial tours, student projects, seminars and workshops. The institution has established an Under Graduate Research Centre with the financial assistance from the Department of Higher Education, Government of Karnataka. This centre is the brain child of our President Dr. M. P. Karki, who is motivated by the statement issued by the noted scientist Bharat Ratna Dr. C. N. R. Rao titled "Catch them Young", to inculcate research tendency among aspiring science students. Special lectures by eminent personalities and well known scientists are arranged to develop research bent of



mind among students. The user friendly library system, subscription to INFLIBNET, the Audio-visual room with ICT gadgets, state of the art Language Laboratories are put to the best possible use to enrich the curriculum.

Feedback System

Feedback from all stakeholders in terms of its relevance and appropriateness of the curriculum in catering to the needs of the society / economy / environment is collected in formal and informal ways periodically and communicated to the departments and the concerned authorities.

CRITERION II : TEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The institution ensures wide publicity of administration process which involves the distribution of prospectus to prospective students and students are selected on the basis of performance in qualifying examinations and in compliance of the stipulations by the government and the affiliating University. However, in keeping with the vision and mission of the institution, the students belonging to SC/ST, differently abled section, Minority Communities, women and economically weaker sections are given priority in admission. From the current academic year the Education department of the Government of Karnataka has introduced an online admission process.

Catering to student Diversity

A one day Orientation Programme is conducted for the first semester B.A, B.Sc, B.Com and B.B.A students at the beginning of the academic year. Slow and advanced learners are identified and remedial coaching is provided to the slow learners. However, the needy students are unwilling to make use of this facility. The college has the active IQAC which monitors all the academic activities of the college. In order to enhance advanced level of knowledge among the staff and students, they are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops organized by the college and other educational institutions.

Teaching Learning Process:

Teachers prepare teaching plans and maintain a dairy which contains term plans, lecture plans and the topics covered in each lectures. Teachers write diaries regularly and meticulously prepare the conspectus. Conventional method of lecture is supplemented by ICT aided teaching and seminars



wherever necessary and possible. In order to inculcate and develop research interest among students, they are encouraged to take up minor research project making use of the facilities available in the Under Graduate Research Centre established in the college. Students from I and III Semester B.Sc are involved in the Research Project sanctioned by the "Karnataka Jnana Ayoga" during the current year. The college organizes special lectures by eminent scholars and resource persons from time to time. These lecture programmes are organized by different departmental associations.

Teacher Quality

There were 33 permanent faculties and the Management has appointed 33 temporary faculties. 50% of the permanent faculty possesses doctorate degree. At present there are 25 permanent teachers among whom 11 possess doctorate degree. Teachers have attended refresher and orientation courses. Teachers are actively involved in research work, minor research projects and attend national and international conferences and present and publish their research papers. Some teachers have received recognition for their contributions in their respective fields. They are being honored with state level awards.

Evaluation Process and Reforms

The University conducts semester examinations. The regulations of the university are strictly followed and communicated to the students. The progress of the students is closely monitored by conducting two unit tests and home assignments in accordance with the guidelines of the University and also through project work, seminar presentation and the Academic Advisors. Students have all time access to the evaluated answer scripts. Grievances regarding the evaluation of University exams are referred to the University as per the norms. Students are advised to improve their academic performances and overall conduct of the students is being regularly monitored by the respective academic advisors and the discipline Committee of the college.

Student performance and learning outcomes.

The performance of students in university examinations is noteworthy. In Arts Stream, the result is above 85%, in science section it is above 95%, in Commerce it is 95% and BBA it is 70% in past five years. A good number of students passed with first class with distinction and 11 students got ranks to the University in past five years. Two students secured Gold medals and cash prizes at the University and the state level. A good number of our two students have won Gold, Silver and Bronze medals in sports events organized by the University and the State Government. Last year our students emerged as General Champion at the university Athletic Meet.



Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Promotion of Research

Research Committee is constituted to monitor the research activities. The institution encourages the faculty to pursue research by under taking MRP. Though the college does not have recognition as research centre, two of our faculty members is recognized as Research Guide for Ph.D and M.Phil. 10 Minor Research Projects have been completed by teachers during the past four years and there are 4 ongoing research projects. Two teachers have submitted the Ph.D Thesis for the award of the Degree to the Karnatak University. Three of the faculty members have presented their papers in international conferences, 5 in national seminars and 7 served as resource persons in workshops during the academic year 2014-15. The college has organized 09 UGC sponsored seminars/conferences/workshops during the period under review.

Resource mobilization for Research

Researchers are encouraged to submit proposals to funding agencies such as UGC, Department of Science and Technology, Govt. of Karnataka (VGST), Neeti Ayoga Govt. of India New Delhi. The institution has established an **Undergraduate Research Centre** with a Prime Objective of encouraging young and ambitious students with potential for research and to provide them with good infrastructural facilities. IQAC and Research Committee encourage and prioritize inter disciplinary research. Though seminars and workshops are organized by the different departments, inter-departmental collaborations are encouraged so that entire teaching and non-teaching staff participate in the whole process of conduct of such programmes. As a consequence of this institutional unity is achieved.

Research Facilities

The institution has necessary infrastructure for research activity with many departments having acquired apparatus suitable for carrying out research, the well stacked library with specialized collections books and journals and INFLIBNET access to e-resources. Department of Science and Technology Govt. of Karnataka has sanctioned rupees 30 lakhs in the last five years for the infrastructural development to carryout research projects. The institution has nominated Dr. S. P. Hegde as scientific advisor to UGRC and he is very proactive in providing expert advice to our faculty and the students and helping the



institution in preparing the Research Project proposals and in carrying out the research project after it is sanctioned. Karnataka Jnana Ayoga has sanctioned Rs. 25 lakhs to our UGRC Research Project. Our students and faculty of the Chemistry Department are now engaged in the project with an able guidance of our scientific advisor.

Research Publications and Awards

The faculties have published good number of Research papers in the National / International Journals or as chapters in book. Some of the facuty have also published books and articales in seminar / conference proceedings too.

Consultancy

Some faculty members offer consultancies in an informal way. The institution encourages the faculty to use their expertise within the campus and outside the campus. They are further advised to take necessary precautions while doing so, because their regular teaching and learning process in the college is not adversely affected. Their absence from the college on consultancy work is treated as On Official Duty (OOD) and their services are recognized if the faculty follows the procedures laid down by the institution. Biodiversity, Yakshagana, English and Kannada literature and language, water and soil analysis, Entreprenuership development and the Environmental Studies and land utilization are some of the major areas in which the faculty has been consulted.

Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility.

The extension activities of the college aim to address the community issues by sensitizing the youth and the public about such issues through education and awareness programmes. The priority areas of the institutional social responsibility initiatives and outreach activities include Blood donation, Road repairs, Swachh Bharat Abhiyana, Yuva Saptaha, Vanamahotsava, Awareness programme for rural folks on environment, Yoga and Pranayama, Drug abuse, Anti-plastic compaign etc. Our faculty members participate as Resource persons in many such programmes organized by Panchayat Raj Institutions of the Govt. The NSS, NCC, Rover's, Red Cross are actively involved in the extension and outreach activities. Our students travelled even up to Manipal Hospital to donate blood to save the patient who was suffering from a Dengue fever. Annual special camp of NSS unit is most important outreach programme of the institution. The institution solicits stake holder participation through feedback mechanism.



Collaborations

The college collaborated with other institutions like Forest Department, Agriculture and Horticulture Department, Free Legal Aid Cell of the local court, local financial and service institutions like LIC, KVGB, Vidya Poshak Dharwad, e-Goal and SBI in organizing various programmes and conferences. Members of the faculty have carried out research work in collaboration with reputed institutions like IISc and Karnataka Jnana Ayoga.

CRITERION IV – INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Physical Facilities

The college has a vast campus of 50 acres with built up area of 7,991 ^{m2}. Infrastructural facilities are available for academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Spacious and well furnished classrooms, well equipped laboratories, central library with spacious separate reading room for girls and boys, an assembly hall, an Indoor stadium with two Badminton Courts, Multi Gym, Rest Room for girls and a sprawling play ground for outdoor sports activities are the highlights of the infrastructure. The college has a ladies hostel, staff room, separate toilets for boys and girls, vehicle parking space, canteen and pure drinking water facility.

Library as a Learning Resources

The library committee supervises all activities of the library. Library services are computerized. Two Reading Rooms one for boys and one for girls, reprographic facility, air conditioned internet connected reference room, INFLIBNET access, are some of the facilities available in the library. The library has 61,178 books, 15 journals and periodicals and regular enrichment of the library is taken up.

IT Infrastructure

The college has 51 computers, 5 laptops, 3 LCD Projectors, Printers, Internet and LAN facility for office and library. All the science Departments are provided with desktops. Smart boards and laptop are provided to science departments on need base. The college has its website <u>www.sdmchonavar.org</u>



Maintenance of Campus Facilities:

The college has budgetary provisions for maintenance of buildings, furniture, equipments and computers. It has an advisory committee consisting of senior faculty members for the maintenance of common facilities available on the campus which is named as 'Care Committee'. The repair works are outsourced as and when required. Infrastructure is optionally utilized as they are being shared by sister institutions on the campus.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

Student Mentoring and Support

To ensure healthy relation between the students and teachers, to provide support information, guidance and encouragement, to counsel and guide students to plan their career and to improve student outcome academic advisors system is implemented. The advisory system is further supplemented by mechanisms like guidance cell, grievances redressal cell and student welfare office.

The institution publishes its updated prospectus annually which provides all the necessary information like courses offered, additions of courses, subject combinations, fee structure, facilities available, scholarships and freeships available, regulations framed by the college to maintain the dignity and decorum of the institutions etc. More than 80% of the students are benefited by the 19 various kinds of scholarships, freeships and financial aid. Philanthropists are approached for their help to support talented but poor students in getting higher education in the college. The Management reimburses the fees of all those students who secure Gold Medals, in various competitions conducted by the University, Rank holders, University Blues and the NCC cadets who are selected for R. D. parade. To promote and encourage student's creative and imaginative talents, the college publishes an annual miscellany titled 'Sharavati'.

Student Progression

The college closely monitors student progression through its career Guidance and Placement Cell. The cells provide training and arrange campus interviews for the placement of the students. On an average 30% of students are



placed in different jobs every year. Students are exposed to awareness for higher learning by arranging a visit to advanced research centres and industries and centers of higher learning.

Student Participation and Activities.

The college has an active Alumni Association. Students are encouraged to take part in cultural and sports activities. During the period under review they have won national/ state/university/district/taluk level prizes. The college athlets have emerged as Athletic Champions in recently held University Athletic Meet. The college Volley ball team and shuttle Badminton teams have won in zonal and inter-zonal competitions.

Academic and administrative bodies have student representatives. The best achievers of the college are honored by the college. People from various cultural and academic fields even from outside the college are selected to receive the honour by the college. All these activities motivate our students to participate in such activities.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

Institutional Vision and Leadership:

The College is run by the Malnad Progressive Education Society, Honavar which is the Governing Body of the college. The Management has three tiered structure. It consists of a General Body, a Governing Council and an Executive Committee. The Executive Committee which has 9 members whose term of office is 3 years, elected from Governing Council of the Management. Principal is the ex-officio member of the Management. The Executive Committee is responsible for the execution of all decisions taken by the Governing Council and General Body. The participative and democratic principle of the management propels all plans and policies and their effective implementation.

At the college level several committees are constituted for participatory and decentralized administration. IQAC is the internal co-ordination monitoring body. Redressal Cell looks after the grievances. Various Committees like Discipline, Anti ragging, women's cell, CASH etc. have been constituted to address different concerns of the students.

Students elect their class representative through democratic process in the election and secretaries are elected by these representatives. These secretaries



are very important members of the college Union and Gymkhana and take part in the functioning of various committees and contribute to the decision making. The NCC (Army and Navy), NSS, Red-cross, Rover-Ranger and various departmental associations groom the leadership among the students. The institution has been working with CLHRD Mangalore, an institution which trains the trainer. The Government of Karnataka through the Department of Higher Education has entered MOU with some Private Universities in the state to train the college teachers. Accordingly our college is tagged to Manipal University which conducts orientation courses to teachers.

Team work leads to the best practices of the institution. The college believes in decentralizing governance. The conveners of college level committees together with their members hold meetings to formulate policies and guidelines for implementation. At department level the teachers in charge of the various departments autonomously work towards fulfilling the aims and objectives of their departments within the accepted set of frameworks. The concept of participatory management followed by the Principal leads to involvement of all sections of the college including students in their capacity as members and leaders of various committees.

Strategy Development and Deployment

The IQAC evolves mechanism to ensure smooth functioning of administrative system. The institution has a perspective plan for development. The need of the students, feasibility and sustainability are the aspects considered for inclusion on the plan. Each Department under the leadership of the HOD meet at the beginning of every semester prepare their unit plan, distribution of teaching work, strategies to be adopted to handle problem child collectively.

All the departments in the college conduct their departmental meeting periodically and review their strategies and make necessary changes. The Principal reviews the unit plan and syllabus completion along with the attendance of the students.

Faculty Empowerment Strategies.

Permanent faculties are recruited by the Management after taking necessary approval from the Department of Higher Education Government of Karnataka. Management appoints Guest Faculty on merit basis. The institution encourages faculty development programmes for the staff. Teachers submit selfappraisals for evaluation of their performance annually. Student feedback on the performance of the teachers is collected. Students are properly oriented before



they are given feedback proforma. After collecting the feedback they are analyzed by the Principal and the Management and corrective measures are evolved whenever necessary.

The institution is putting in continuous efforts to improve the professional competencies of the teachers by encouraging them to participate in orientation programmes, workshops so as to enable them to have an exposure which will ensure an academic excellence in them. Teachers are also engaged in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

Financial Management and Resources Mobilization

Annual budget is prepared by the college and the same is placed before the Management for their consideration and approval for the optimum utilization of funds. Management mobilizes the resources and utilise the same for creating infrastructure and its maintenance.

The financial management of the college is totally transparent and all major purchases are made after due process of tenders, quotations and preparation of comparative statements. All these are scrutinized by the Fund Monitoring Committee headed by the Principal. Judicious expenditure of funds with defined protocol for purchases by the responsible authorities with fixed accountability and regular audit (Internal and external) of the Income and Expenditure accounts indicates transparency in financial affairs.

Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

Established in 2005, the IQAC is a proactive body. It prepares the perspective plan for the Institution in consultation with all the stake holders. In order to ensure constructive and positive performance of all the stake holders IQAC ensures the presence of all the members in the meeting. The decisions taken in IQAC meeting are communicated to the staff and the students. It maintains all the activities of the college for quality enhancement and strives to achieve a creative balance between the academic mission of the college and its executive capacity between financial ability and the requirements of the stake holders.

CRITERION VII-INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

Environment Consciousness

The Institution visionaries had chosen one of the best locations while establishing the college. They saw to it that learners get very clean, fresh air and



light throughout the day, all through the year so as to make the learning environment very pleasant. Plantation on the campus provide lush green ambience to the college. Campus is free from polluting vehicles, plastics, tobacco products and e-waste. The college observes Vanamahotsava every year in collaboration with Forest Department. Entire college including the teaching and nonteaching staff, students and the Management involves themselves in cleaning and maintaining the campus.

Innovations

A host of innovative practices are followed by the college aimed at creating conducive atmosphere to develop competence, confidence and a sense of belongingness among stake holders.

Best Practices

Four outstanding best practices are:

- The academic advisors system: To ensure healthy relationship between the teachers and the taught, to provide individual care and attention, support, information and guidance, academic advisors are nominated. This was introduced 25 years ago by the then Principal Dr. N. R. Nayak it was first of the kind and then appreciated by the then Director of Collegiate Education Dr. Smt. Selvi Das.
- 2) Achievers at the University and state level competitions are felicitated in the presence of all students, their parents and public at large to inspire and motivate students. This practice also make the college education more a goal oriented rather than an examination oriented.
- 3) Achievers among students are given free education by the Management in recognition of their service to the institution and the society. It also attracts more number of talented students towards our college.
- To encourage student participation in extracurricular activities, selected sportsmen are supported with nutritious food to supplement their physical energy.



1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

VISION:

"To achieve academic and professional excellence with character building".

MISSION:

To instill self confidence in the student community through education with an emphasis on competitive spirit to face the challenges.

The VISION and MISSION are printed in the prospectus of the college. These are distributed to the students at the time of admission. The importance of Vision and Mission explained to the students in detail during the orientation programme which is held in the beginning of the academic year.

Vision, Mission and Objectives are also displayed in important places like College entrance, Library etc.

OBJECTIVES:

- Establishing educational institutions.
- Acquisition of knowledge.
- Human resource development.
- Development of social responsibility.
- Inspiration to civic sense.
- Creation of sportive spirit.
- Development of Art, Culture and discipline.
- Inculcation of patriotism.
- Environmental awareness.

The copy of prospectus is circulated to the members of the Management. The contents of the prospectus are communicated to the parents/ guardians during parents meet. The contents are explained to the teachers during staff



meeting. The details are published in the college website so as to reach other stakeholders.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The Time Table committee prepares academic calendar prior to the commencement of the academic year as per the instructions of the Principal. While doing so, the committee will strictly adhere to the guidelines set by the University regarding number of teaching hours stipulated to complete the syllabus prescribed for each subject. It ensures proper teaching –learning transactions and proper evaluation.

The departmental meetings are held regularly. The distribution of workload to individual teachers is assigned in the beginning of the academic year. The topics, syllabus and classes for the academic year are distributed among the faculties of the concerned departments and at the end of the each semester all faculties submit the details of syllabus completed to the Principal.

Academic dairy is maintained by the teachers and dairy is monitored by HOD and the Principal regularly. The curriculum, Results, Time-Table and other important data are uploaded in the college website.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The Board of Study (BoS) comprising senior faculty of the affiliated colleges is constituted by the University. Each subject will have independent Board of Study which designs and develops the syllabi. Syllabus thus framed will be sent to all the affiliated colleges.

Orientation/refresher course /winter school programs/workshops organized by Academic staff colleges of different University and KU Dharwad helps the teachers in translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices.

The following support systems are available in the college to enable the teachers to ensure effective delivery of curriculum.

- Provision of e-library and internet facility by the college.
- The library of the college provides sufficient books, reference materials, journals, magazines and INFLIBNET service.



- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.
 - Teachers prepare their teaching plan in advance and accordingly the teaching is carried out.
 - Teachers are encouraged to practice interactive method of teaching with active participation of students.
 - Student projects, study tours, field works are carried out as a part of curriculum.
 - There is rich library with reading space and effective book issue system to satisfy the students.
 - Students have open access to the computers and internet in the library for any reference work like e-books, inflibnet...etc.
 - Department of English conducted a Two day National Level workshop on "Designing Syllabus for Funcional English" during last academic year. The resolutions passed during the workshop along with the recomandations made by expert resource persons are submitted to the University.
 - Training to teachers For the benefit of newly appointed teachers, the college conducts orientation programs to enhance their knowledge and teaching skills.
- 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The institution has network and interaction with the following beneficiaries;

- The Green Global Research Institute, Muroor, Kumta: Our Institution is utilizing the expertise and infra structure of this institute so as to encourage and motivate our students to take-up research and explore extra-learning resources.
- Indian Institute of Science, Branch Kumta: The Scientists/Research Scholors working in this institution regularly visit our UGRC to make use of the sophisticated equipments available at our center. This intern helps our science students to learn the research techniques.
- M.Sc General Chemistry final year students have to complete project as an integral part of the course. In this regard they visit MRPL Mangalore,



Daffodil Pvt.Ltd., Mangalore, Prakruti Agrotech Pvt.Ltd. Ankola, Microlabs Bangalore and Bagalkot Cements, Bagalkot.

- Departmental Associations organize lecture series and project exhibitions by inviting experts from the various feilds. This provides an opportunity to our students to interact with the resource persons which inturn help them in enhancing their skill competence and also creates awareness among the students about job opportunities.
- Commerce and B.B.A. students also have project works as an integral part of the course. The department arranges for industrial visit.

In an affiliated college the curriculum is prescribed by the University. However those who are members of BoS can suggest/contribute while revising the syllabus and make it more relevant to the changing needs of the society.

Students Feedback: The feedback from the students is collected at the end of every academic year in the specific format. The final year results analysis is also considered as feedback process.

Alumni Feedback: Feedback from alumni is collected whenever they visit our college for various reasons.

Academic peers : The feedback is collected from the external examiners of various Colleges and Universities who visit our institutioin to conduct UG and



PG practical examinations. The feedback is also collected from experts who have been invited for guest lectures.

Our college is affiliated to Karnatak University Dharwad which prescribes syllabi for all the courses.

We have introduced three add-on courses funded by UGC. The syllabus is framed by the concerned faculty members in accordance with the guidelines set by the UGC and the University.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Our college always ensures that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation as follows:

- Assignments, projects and unit tests are conducted to understand how the students are coping with the syllabus.
- Opinions and feedback from the students and parents are collected.
- Remedial teaching is arranged for slow learner and students belonging to SC/ST, backward class and minority.
- Discussion among the faculty members of the Department time to time about the improvement of students.
- Result analysis made by the faculty members of each department is placed before the Principal who will forward it to the Management. Management after scrutinizing the analysed report suggests corrective measures for the improvement in the teaching learning process wherever necessary.
- Co-curricular and Extra curricular activities are carried out in the college throughout the academic year under the supervision of faculty members which will serve the purpose of achieving objectives of curriculam implementation

1.2 Academic Flexibility

- 1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.
 - **Pourohitya:** Paurohitya forms an integral part of Vedic tradition. It is a known fact that there is always insufficient number of purohitas in our



society. Therefore Paurohitya was introduced as a value added Certificate course which could help many students who are interested in it either can choose as a occupation or as a value addition to the degree.

- Hindustani Music: Music is an integral part of our ancient culture. As Honavar is surrounded by villages with rich cultural heritage and our institution has well established music department with National and International level faculties, institution thought it proper to introduce an add-on course in Hidustani Music. Thus we have introduced UGC funded add-on course in music.
- Human Rights: In order to convert human force into human resources the institution has introduced a UGC funded foundation course in Human Rights.
- Communication Skill: To develop communication skill in English, our institution has introduced a self financed three months course. The language laboratory established in the college is extensively used for the purpose.

Since our college is affiliated to Karnatak University Dharwad, the Institution does not offer twinning/ dual degree. However the students studying in B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com can simultaneously join for the Cirtificate / Diploma in value added courses like Hindustani Music, Human Rights, Communication Skills and Paurohitya.

 - Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programs: Within the program: The students who have passed PU/XII science and commerce can get the admission for B.A, B.Com Courses.
 - Enrichment courses: Students are given training for the development of soft skill. They are further guided through career guidance and placement cell to face competitive examinations and entrance tests for Post Graduate Studies. For PG Students (M.Com and M.Sc) NET/SLET coaching classes are also conducted.
- 1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes, our college offers B.B.A, B.Sc.with Computer Science and Electronics and M.Sc in General Chemistry and M.Com as self financed programme with the permission of Karnatak University Dharwad and Government of Karnataka. The intake capacity for B.B.A. is 50, the students with minimum 40% marks in qualifying examination are admitted on demand. B.Sc. with Computer Science



and Electronics have intake capacity of 30, students with minimum 50% marks in qualifying examination are admitted on demand.

M.Sc in General Chemistry and M.Com courses were started in 2011-12 with 30 intake capacity. Subsequently intake capacity of M.Com is enhanced to 40, of which 50% seats are filled by the management of the institution and the remaining 50% seats by Karnatak University, Dharwad as per prevailing rules of the University.

Admission Procedure: From last academic year Higher Education Department of Government of Karnataka and Karnatak University Dharwad have invited applications through online from prospective candidates. The process of selection is purely based on merit i.e, the marks obtained in PU Second year for UG and marks obtained in B.Sc. and B.Com for PG courses.

Curriculum: Since our college is affiliated to Karnatak University Dhrawad, the curriculum is designed by the University. However, the project work is designed by the faculties of the concerned department.

Fee structure: The fee structure is as per the norms stated by KU Dharwad and Govt. of Karnataka and Management.

Teacher Qualification: Qualified and experienced faculties are appointed as per the norms of the KU Dharwad and Govt. of Karnataka. Apart from this, guest faculties from the neighboring college/industries are invited to deliver the lecture. Even the services of retired professors are also utilized for the benefit of the students.

Salary: The MPE Society, Honnavar which runs our college provides salary/Provident Fund to the teaching and non-teaching faculties.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes. Our college puts sincere efforts to provide additional skill oriented programs relevant to regional and global employment markets. The college provides the services of English Language Laboratory for developing English language proficiency. In Under Graduate Research Center B.Sc students carry out a project on water and soil analysis with the help of Vision Group of Science and Technology, Bangalore, Govt. of Karnataka.

For enhancing Employability skills of the students the placement cell conducts guidance lectures, aptitude tests, quiz and mock interviews.

 Special orientation programs are organized through Career Guidance Cell on Entrepreneurship to encourage them for self employment.



- Enterpreneurship Cell organizes one day workshop for final year students to create self employement awareness.
- NCC (Army/Navy) units are training the students to enable them to join defense services.
- Yakhagana training is regularly conducted for the students.
- NSS trains its volunteers to inculcate social responsibilities among them.
- 1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?
 - Yes. The institution has a study center of IGNOU in which regular students and public can pursue B.A., B.Com, BPP and Certificate course in Functional English, Teaching English as second language, Tourism, Entrepreneurship and Rural Development.
 - The college has recognized study centre for the distance mode of education of Karnatak University Dharwad. The drop-outs in the regular mode are encouraged to continue education through distance mode.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

- 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?
 - Special lectures are arranged by experts/Scientists/Entrepreneurs/Professionals on various aspects of science and socio-economic issues to motivate students.
 - Debates are conducted on burning issues.
 - Industrial and educational tours are regularly conducted.
 - Educative film shows are organized for the benefit of the students.
 - Blood-donation Camps are organized annually.
 - Demonstrations, Awareness programs are arranged on Disaster Management, 'First-aid', fire safety etc.
 - Awareness programs are arranged on Clean-India, use of green-energy and minimizing solid wastes etc through different units like NCC/NSS/ROVER SCOUT/RED- CROSS / College Union.
 - Jatha is conducted by the students to create awareness among public on the Right to Vote.



- Under Graduate Research Center of the College is put to the best use of students to motivate them to take up basic scientific research.
- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Following efforts are made by the institution to enhance the learning experience of the students:

- Personality development programs are arranged to prepare the students for future challenges and shape them in a better manner.
- Orientation programmes/workshops are organized by Career Guidance Cell where various expert trainers are invited to train the students to face the selection process confidently
- Industrial tours are organized to expose them to modern technology.
- Study tours expose students to the ground reality and better understanding of issues and problems.
- Workshops are organized and eminent IAS officers are invited as resource persons to inspire students to choose career in Civil Services like IAS, IPS, IFS etc.
- Placement Cell has organized campus interviews by inviting IT, BPO and Banking sectors.
- 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Gender: The orientation program for the first year students in the beginning of the academic year educates and creates awareness on gender sensitivity.

Women cell and CASH creates awareness about the crimes against women and provides self confidence about self protections. Lectures are organized by eminent speakers on the legal issues and acts to create awareness about women's rights.

Climatic Change: The Environmental Science is a mandatory subject for U.G. students studying in II Semester where the causes and consequences of environmental problems are discussed. The institution observes World Environmental Day where the students plant the saplings to improve the campus greenery.

Environmental education: NSS and NCC camps create awareness among the students about environment. Swachhatha Abhiyana helps to keep the campus



clean, green and eco friendly. Tree plantation programme is organized every year.

Human Rights: Study of Human right is a part of a curriculum for undergraduate students in second semester. The Management and the head of the Institution are very keen and cautious to see that, there is no violation of human rights in the campus.

A National Seminar was organized by Department of Political Science to provide a platform for discussion on such issues and bring awareness among the students.

ICT: The institution has made all the provisions to faculty and students to cope with the digital era.

Computer application is a mandatory subject for B.A. and B.Sc IV semester and for B.Com, II to VI semester courses as prescribed by the Karnatak University syllabi.

Teachers are provided with computers and internet facility.

The students have open access to internet and inflibnet in library.

The institution has a well equipped Audio-Visual room with LCD projector and computers.

There are Smart boards for presentations and lectures.

- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 * moral and ethical values
 - * employable and life skills
 - * better career options
 - * community orientation

Moral and Ethical Values:

- Elocution and recitation competitions are annually conducted on "Bhagavadgeetha" and certificates of appreciation are given to encourage the students to read and absorb the moral values from the great Epics.
- The institution has a tradition of celebrating environmental day by involving students in tree planting to inculcate sense of responsibility towards environment.
- The students are made to involve in Clean India campaign by organizing Cleaning program in public places. The NSS, NCC, Rovers, Red-cross, the College Union and Parampara Koota are actively involved in conducting such programs.



 During the academic year the students celebrate Gandhi Jayanti, Valmiki Jayanti, Basava Jayanti and Ambedkar Jayanti, Vivekananda Jayanti. These celebrations helps the student in imbibing the values represented by great persons.

Employment life skills:

- The Career Guidance and Counselling Cells are very actively involved in making the students feel employable. This is done by arranging orientation and training programs, so that students come out successfully through selection process. As a result there is good number of students selected in the campus selection.
- Special lectures and demonstrations or crash courses on Yoga are organized to help the students to improve memory and concentration.
- Our college students achieve high standards on enrichment activities in music. Both students and teachers of music department perform "Masada Sangeeta Programme" on fourth Wednesday of every month. Artists drawn from different parts of India are invited to perform. These practices are helpful for the overall development of student's confidence and motivate them to take up music as one of the career options.

Better Career Options: Our College interacts with the HR department of Industries and various research centers through the placement cell. Several industries have provided opportunities to our students by absorbing them as their permanent employees. Many industries together visit our college on the occasion of "Brahat Udyoga Mela".

Community Orientation:

- NSS students are holding week-long camps in selected village every year where, they educate the villagers on environment, waste management, cleanliness and health care issues to ensure the sustainable growth in all these aspects.
- Our institution in colabration with Rotary Club of Honavar organizes special lectures by inviting experienced Doctors on AIDS awareness and prevention.
- Students' Union organizes Jatha to create awareness among the public on "Right to Vote".
- Bio-club has involved the students in the project- PBR (People's Biodiversity Register) for the documentation of biodiversity & its traditional knowledge for all the Gram Panchayats of Honavar Taluk. Thus it helps the Gram Panchayats to document the wealth of the area which is necessary to protect their right on it in future.



1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- The feedback collected from parents is discussed in the departmental/association meetings to arrive at a conclusion. Suggestions regarding the syllabus are communicated to the members of BoS.
- The feedback collected from students at the end of the year is analyzed and used for providing better facilities in the campus.
- The feedback collected from outgoing students and the members of the alumni who visit our college for various purposes are used to improve the quality of education.
- Based on the feedback received from the management/govt. officials/resource persons/industrialists and external examiners, our college strives hard to implement at various levels.
- For example the attendance committee and admission committee keep on regrouping the timings and subjects so as to accommodate choices which meet students demand and preferences. This practice has reduced shortage in attendance and failure in exams.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The IQAC of the college receives information from the coordinater/HODs and monitors each enrichment programs through various committees. The committees organize wide range of extra curricular and enrichment opportunities which build up leadership qualities. The committees help in planning and execution of the programs throughout the academic year in the systematic way. Review meeting is conducted after the programme so as to recognize the pros and cons of such programmes. Positive results are appreciated and concerned organizers are encouraged to continue with such practices.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Our college is affiliated to Karnatak University Dharwad. It follows the syllabus prescribed by the University. Many senior faculties of our college are the members of the BoS. They contribute to the curriculum development by



participating in Workshops/Seminars organized to design and develop curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. The institution collects feedback on the curriculum from student and parents. The opinion of the students & stakeholders on the curriculum is forwarded to the University through the members of BoS for implementation.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?) Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

Two new PG programmes M.Com and M.Sc in General Chemistry have been introduced. As our college is situated in rural area, outgoing students were forced to go to Dharwad, nearly 215 km away from our town. The people around Honnavar are coming from usually poor family, hence it becomes difficult for many of them to send their children to Dharwad or any other far off cities. Considering the demand from students, parents and the society the management of our college started M.Sc in General Chemistry and M.Com Courses to cater to the higher education needs of the students.

BCA: The process of introducing the course is initiated.



CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures publicity through the following:

- a. Prospectus: The prospectus provides essential information about the institution, courses offered, rules and regulations pertaining to admission.
- b. Institutional Website: www.sdmchonavar.org provides details about the Vision, Mission, Objectives, Courses, faculty members and other information pertaining to admission.
- c. Advertisement in news papers and local TV channels.
- d. Notice Board: Information on admission is displayed on the college notice board.
- e. By staff, students, parents, alumni and well-wishers.

School Contact Programs:

Experienced faculties visit the feeding colleges to create awareness among the students regarding our institution and higher education facilities available. There is absolute transparency in the admission process.

- The College adheres to University Admission Guidelines.
- The College has an admission committee consisting of the faculty members who will take care of the procedures of the admission.
- List of selected candidates is put up on the notice board.
- Scrutiny of the original certificates, academic counseling is done at the time of admission.
- Finally, candidates are instructed to pay the prescribed fees in the college office to complete the admission process.
- The Admission process ensures social justice by providing equal opportunities to all sections of the society including SC/ST, OBC and Minority.



2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other)to various programmes of the Institution.

The students are selected for admission to B.A., B.Sc., B.Com and B.B.A programmes on the basis of their performance in the qualifying examination (PU Course) and in accordance with the reservation policy of the government. The cut-off percentage for admission at the entry level is 35%.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The students are admitted for B.A., B.Sc., B.Com and B.B.A programmes with their minimum eligibility prescribed by the affiliating University (Karnatak University Dharwad). The students with high academic achievement as well as those with minimum eligibility percentage are admitted with equal consideration.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes. Review of the admission process is done by the Admission Committee headed by the Principal and faculty of concerned departments and changes are made in the mechanism as and when required by taking in to confidence of all the stakeholders.

The improvements suggested by the Admission Committee during the last few years are:

- To reorganize Admission Committee comprising representatives from all the departments.
- To review and re-design the prospectus.
- To avoid inconvenience 'Help Desk' facility is provided during admission to assist the applicants to fill the application forms and to guide them in the admission process.
- To create awareness/publicity about the various courses offered, by visiting the neighboring PU colleges.



- To submit proposals to the University seeking additional intake in some streams, to meet the increasing demands in the respective streams with the approval of the Management.
- Students' profile is maintained in separate register in order to review students performance in various curricular/co-curricular/extra-curricular activities. This is reviewed during re-admission process by the Principal and concerned teachers. Interaction with parents and counseling is done as corrective measures.

Such efforts have contributed to the improvement of admission process, better intake, better results and discipline. The feedback received from the students and parents is positive regarding the system adopted.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

Reservation policies of the Government are strictly followed and measures are taken by the college to ensure inclusive policy in the admission.

• SC/ST, OBC and Minorities:

Seats are allotted as per Government norms and these students are assisted in getting fee concessions and scholarships.

• Economically weaker sections:

Large number of students of this category have been admitted and given fee concession in accordance with Government policies on producing income certificate. There are various scholarships and endowment prizes instituted in the college on merit cum income basis.

Women:

The college encourages admission of women candidates. At present, we have more number of girls students. The infrastructural facilities like spacious Ladies' Rest Room, CASH (Committee Against Sexual Harassment), separate sections for ladies in the library and in the canteen, Womens' Cell to look in to the welfare of the women, Ladies' Hostel extension have contributed to enrollment of more number of women students. Gender equity and women's empowerment are part of the policy of the college.

Reasons for increase:

- Improvement in Infrastructural facilities.
- Well-equipped library with good number of Books and journals.
- Computerized services and internet facilities are provided in the library.
- Well qualified and resourceful teaching faculty.
- Students secured ranks in B.A., B. Com, B.Sc. and gold medals in various subjects.
- Campus selection through Placement Cell of the college.
- Training by physical instructor facilitates the students to take part in sports.
- Selected sportsmen are provided with all the facilities like food, track suits and sports equipments.



- Under-graduate Research Center established in the college motivated the students to undertake the research project.
- Academic advisors take personal care of allotted students

Reasons for decrease:

- Two Government colleges and two private un-aided colleges have been started in the nearby area.
- Free education for girls and low fee structure for boys in Government College.
- Increase in trend to go for professional courses.

Actions initiated for improvement:

- Better infrastructure facilities like class rooms, computers and internet facilities are provided.
- Modern teaching aids like PPT, smart board etc. are used.
- Case study techniques and group discussion are used by the teachers in their teaching wherever necessary and possible.
- Facilities are provided for supporting the students, which can motivate them to participate in curricular and extra –curricular activities.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The Institution caters to the needs of differently-abled students as follows.

- The time table is drawn in such a manner that differently-abled students do not face any inconveniences. Class rooms situated in the ground floor are allotted to them.
- Books and reading facilities are made available to the student in the ground floor of the library.
- College Canteen is in the ground floor.
- Ramp facility is provided wherever necessary.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. Students are advised to indicate their interests in curricular/cocurricular/extra-curriclar activities in order to identify students level of knowledge and skills at the time of admission. Having done so, experienced teachers will motivate the students to take up the course of their interest by conducting orientation programmes. On the basis of their interest special



training programmes are conducted by the senior faculties of the college and strategies are adopted to enhance their knowledge and skills in subsequent years.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The following strategies are adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students.

- Orientation courses are conducted for all the freshers by the faculty at the department level.
- Remedial classes: Based on the performance of students in internal examination, slow learners are identified and remedial classes are conducted for them during free hours. Students who have joined the college after passing the supplementary examination of class XII are also included in this remedial coaching. Remedial coaching in practical sessions is also conducted for the science students.
- Enrichment courses: Students are motivated to take up value added certificate (Add-on) courses to make them skilled and competitive in the job market.
- Language lab takes care of the students who need extra coaching in developing communication skills. Spoken English classes are held with special emphasis for students and also outsiders.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

As per the University syllabus, first year students have a compulsory subject on Indian Constitution, Human rights and Environmental studies. Apart from this, the college organizes workshops, awareness programmes, seminars, and lectures from time to time, in connection with issues like gender equity, inclusiveness and environment. Students are trained to protect the environment by organizing environment awareness camps and tree plantation activity on the campus through Science club, Bio-club, NCC, NSS etc. Scholarship counseling is also done for the SC/ST, OBC economically backward students.

Women's councellor and CASH organizes various programmes such as legal awareness for women, health and hygiene, women's empowerment, etc.



2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The college identifies the advanced learners through

- Concerned Academic Advisors.
- Performance in tests.
- Participation in debates/competitions.
- Interaction in the class room.

Teachers provide many opportunities to these students to attain academic excellence and motivate them by the following means.

- Opportunities to participate in seminars and present papers.
- Additional project and field assignments.
- Participation in various University, State and National level competitions.
- Use of E-Resources, free internet facilities.
- Additional books from the department and College library for extra and intensive reading.
- Management encourages them through felicitations and by awarding cash prizes.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - Both centralized (office) and decentralized (departments) database of students are maintained.
 - Students from disadvantaged sections of the society, differently abled are given equal opportunities.
 - Slow learners at the risk of being dropouts are identified through their attendance records, marks obtained in the internal tests. They are given special attention by providing remedial coaching in theory and practicals so that they can do well in the semester examinations.
 - Interaction with the parents.



2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic calendar:

At the end of each academic year, the Principal holds a facultymeeting wherein the Academic calendar with the college events and activities for the next two semesters is chalked out. This is in line with that of the University. The important dates for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are tentatively fixed. The calendar also shows commencement of classes, examination schedule and evaluation schedule.

Teaching plan:

At the beginning of each semester, the work distribution is done at respective department level. The subject wise teaching plan is prepared by the respective teacher under the guidance of the Head of the department. The teacher's diary gives details of the topics to be covered, hours allotted, month wise lesson plan and the work done by the teachers. This is monitored periodically by the Head of the Department and Principal.

Evaluation:

In each semester, two internal assessment tests are conducted. The performance of the students in two internal assessment tests and marks secured in Home Assignments are taken into consideration for internal assessment. Besides theory examinations, internal practical examination is also conducted for science students. Consolidated internal assessment marks of the students are submitted to the University. The academic calendar helps the students and teachers to plan other extra-curricular and co-curricular activities effectively along with the execution of academic duties.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

IQAC contributes to improve teaching - learning process as follows.

- Conducts meetings periodically to discuss means for quality sustenance in the college.
- Arranges general staff meeting with the Principal and Management to evaluate the outcome of the departmental meetings.
- Promotes research and consultancy.
- Makes suggestions for development of infrastructural facilities.
- Obtains feedback on curriculum from students.
- Arranges orientation programme for teachers.



2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Learning is made more student-centric by encouraging interactions, greater group involvement and by adopting various other innovative methods such as

- Eliciting questions from the students in the course of teaching, thus making the process more interactive.
- Collective participation of students in problem oriented subjects and Science practicals by involving students in team work.
- Student Participation in Seminars: Students are encouraged to hold seminars using power point presentations in the class and participate in the seminars.
- Organizing Seminars: Students are involved in organizing seminars, conferences, workshops and fests. Here they learn organizational skills, time management and team work. Whenever National and State Level seminars are held, students are given important roles for the smooth conduct of these events.
- Field Tours: Experiences gained during NCC, NSS camps, Botanical tours, Field Study tour, Industrial visits, Bio-diversity projects such as Peoples Bio-diversity Register, Rangers and Rovers, Red Cross Camps, etc. give a lot of exposure to students.
- Project Work: Students of B.B.A, M.Com. and M.Sc. submit project reports in their final semester which enables them to work independently and creatively.
- Departmental bulletins such as Deepika (Kannada), Blossom (English), Photon (Science) are released annualy. Students are motivated to contribute articles to the bulletins and College magazine (Sharavathi) thus enabling budding writers to explore their creativity and imagination.
- Science and Commerce exhibitions are organized to inculcate team work and leadership qualities.
- Debates & Group Discussions help in improving communication skills.
- Senior students help their juniors in the academics.
- Students participate in various competition organized in and outside the college. Our students bag prizes in most of the competitions held in other colleges.



- Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities organized by various associations of our college helps in the overall development of the students.
- Cultural programmes, competitions and historical tours organized by the "Paramparaa Kootaa" helps the students in understanding our Cultural Heritage and Tradition.
- To inculcate reading and research habits among the students, they are encouraged to utilize the facilities provided in the library which enhances their knowledge.
- Science Departments are provided with Computer Systems and internet facility.
- The college has an Audio Visual hall.
- The college has a **well-stacked** library with a collection of latest books, journals, magazines and periodicals, INFLIBNET and e-resources.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Students get opportunities to showcase their critical thinking and creativity in the following ways:

- Seminars and talks on contemporary issues are organized.
- College Magazine and bulletins of different associations enable young writers to explore their creativity.
- Various associations functioning in the college aim at promoting creativity of every individual student by arranging various types of cocurricular events like quiz and debates. In addition, the opportunities are provided for the following.
- Seminars and power point presentation by the students.
- Participation in various competitions.
- Organizing activities at departmental and intercollegiate level.
- Promoting ADMIN activities, by B.B.A. students.
- Involving students in community work and encouraging them to conduct blood donation camps and blood group identification camps.
- Training and motivating the students to participate in inter-class and inter collegiate competitions to showcase their creative side.



- Inviting Speakers/Resource persons to speak on diverse topics and to share their experiences about real life situations which in turn help the students to have better life skills.
- Conducting various Add-on and Certificate courses to empower the students and equip them with skill based knowledge.
- Participation in the documentation of seminar proceedings and activities of other departments.

Scientific temper is encouraged by:

- Questioning and clarification of doubts in the class by the students.
- Motivating students to undertake research oriented project work.
- Encouraging the students to present papers on current trends, contribute articles for the College Magazine and also for display on the notice boards.
- Organizing and participation in Science exhibitions.
- Inviting renowned persons from different fields to share their ideas, thoughts among the students.
- Promoting participation in seminars, workshops, conferences and Vocational Seminars.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The following facilities are available for effective teaching:

- The Audio-Visual Seminar hall is equipped with computers and LCD projector for multimedia projection. All the science departments are provided with computers with internet facility and few science departments are provided with LCD projectors.
- Smart board is being used by the Botony & Zoology departments.
- The computer lab is equipped with internet enabled computer system.
- The Institution has a well equipped e-library with INFLIBNET facility. The library has a full-fledged Net-Browsing centre.
- NME Connection has been provided to all the science departments in the college.
- Three photocopy centres.

 - Students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through expert lectures by well-known academicians to increase and supplement their knowledge. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars by using IT-enabled tools like PPTs, video clippings and online sources to expose them to creative learning.
 - Workshops, seminars and conferences (regional/national) organized in the college and in other institutions.
 - To expose the faculty members to advanced level of knowledge and skills they are also encouraged to attend seminars and workshops on a regular basis and also present papers at state, national and international conferences.
 - Faculty development programmes (Refreshser/ Orientation programme) conducted by the University.
 - With the aim of quality enhancement, teachers are encouraged to pursue higher studies/research activities.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The institution provides counseling to the students in various aspects.

- The faculty members of the college are engaged in academic and personal counseling such as choice of subjects during admission, shortage of attendance, poor marks in final examination etc. Students are always free to approach teachers for any kind of guidance personal/professional, academic support, motivation and encouragement.
- Academic Advisory system is a regular activity. The Academic Advisor is assigned a set of around 30 students. This enables the Academic Advisor to know about the students' background and progress. The Academic Advisor monitors the regularity in attendance, participation in other activities of the college and the performance of the students in internal tests and semester examination. Teachers take keen interest to guide the students who are under their supervision.
- Career guidance programmes are arranged for the students to help them to plan their future.
- Special training programme is oraganized by the Placement Cell to equip the students for campus interiew.
- Necessary guidance is given to the students who participate in various competitions organized by our and other colleges.

- Students are encouraged to conduct seminars using PPT and present papers.
- Take up Project work

- Computers, LCD, internet and library resources are provided to update their knowledge and teaching methods
- Staff members are motivated to undertake minor research
- Books suggested by the faculty are purchased on a regular basis.

- 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?
 - The library plays an important role in the teaching-learning processes in the college. The institution has a centralized library. The library is well stacked with rare and new books, journals, back volumes, magazines, ebooks, old question papers and so on. Library resources enhance teaching-learning process.
 - Students are directed to the library during the free hours. The library is kept open from 9.00 AM to 5.30 PM on working days.
 - The faculty encourages the students to use the library by giving a list of reference books available in the library.
 - An orientation programme is initiated for first semester studnets to explain the available facilities of our college.
 - NME Internet facility is available in the library.
 - Books, magazines and journals are added to the library every year.
 - New arrivals and news clippings carrying interesting snippets of information are displayed.
 - Students prepare study material, seminars, assignments etc., using the library resources.
 - Students are given book-review exercise as assignments.
 - INFLIBNET facilities are provided in the library.
- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The faculty follow lesson plans to complete the syllabus. So, the institution normally does not face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time. Sometimes due to unexpected loss of working days, declaration of holidays by the Government or strikes/protests etc., the institution faces challenges in completing the curriculum. These problems are overcome by engaging extra classes. In case, any teacher avails long leave, loss of classes will be compensated by engaging special classes.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The institution adopts the following measures to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning



- A formal feedback is taken from the students every year reflecting the quality of teaching.
- Regular observation by the Principal.
- Random interaction with the students.

- Feedback from the outgoing students.
- Feedback from parents.
- Principal addresses the grievances whenever necessary.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The procedure of the recruitment of permanent teachers is done strictly on the basis of the guidelines laid down by UGC and Karnataka state Government. During the last eight years the Government has not permitted to appoint permanent teachers. However the college management recruits the required staff on temporary basis

The procedure of the recruitment of temporary teachers is as follows:

- For the selection of temporary teachers, management advertises in leading Regional/State newspapers.
- Applications received are short listed.
- The selection committee comprises of the Principal, the President, the EC members of the governing body and concerned subject experts.
- The candidates are selected on the basis of merit, oral interviews and their performance in demonstration lectures during the interview.
- The management approves the decision of the committee and selects the teacher.
- The management retains the competent staff through measures like annual salary appraisal and providing PF facility.
- The newly recruited faculties will under go the orientation course, in which the external experts will participate as resource persons.

 - The College management has sent a proposal to start the Bachelor of Computer Applications (B.C.A) course from the next academic year to cater to the needs of the students. Well Equipped Computer Lab has been established for this purpose.

- 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the institution has introduced the evaluation of teachers by the students. The feed back is collected from the students every year and the same is analysed by the Principal and Management. Based on the result, the Principal and management guide the concerned teachers and ensure improvement in the quality of teaching and learning. The entire evaluation process is done confidentially.



2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

As per the University guidelines, two internal assessment tests of 20 marks each are conducted in each semester. Apart from this, one home assignment with a maximum of 10 marks is given to students. The IA tests are conducted as per the annual question paper pattern. The assessed answer scripts are distributed to the students so that they will get to know their performance directly. Besides these Internal Assessment exercises, the students are instructed to write the answers to the comprehensive questions given in the textbooks, which are corrected by the teachers. The seminars will be conducted in the regular classes in which the students present their papers related to the topic.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

As per the University guidelines, two internal assessment tests of 20 marks each are conducted in each semester. Apart from this, one home assignment with a maximum of 10 marks is given to students. The IA tests are conducted as per the annual question paper pattern. Semester end examination is conducted as per the University time-table under the supervision of Chief Superintendent (External) appointed by the University.

For the smooth conduct of IA Tests, our college has constituted an Examination Committee which conducts the examination in accordance with annual seating pattern.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Semester end examination result is announced by the University. Marks card received from the University are distributed to the students through the college. Students have the provision to apply for revaluation of their answer scripts.

There is an Examination Committee headed by senior faculties to conduct IA test. Soon after the evaluation of the answerscripts, results are announced by the concerned teacher and signature of the student is obtained at the end of the announcement of the second IA test result. The marks obtained by the students in the IA test and home assignment are forwarded to the University.



Any grievances related to IA test are settled at the level of teachers of the concerned subject. Grievances relating to University examination are handled by the Principal according to university norms.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

College is following semester system since 2005. Accordingly two internal assessment tests and one home assignment are conducted in a semester for every subject. After the evaluation, the list of the internal marks is sent to the University online. At the end of the semester, written examination is conducted by the University and central evaluation is conducted by the University.

- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
 - Internal Assessment Tests are conducted as per the university norms and marks are awarded on the basis of the students' performance in written test and home assighment.
 - The assessed papers are distributed to the students. Any grievances related to IA test are settled at the level of teachers of the concerned subject.
 - Soon after the evaluation of the answerscripts, results are announced by the concerned teacher and signature of the student is obtained at the end of the announcement of the second IA test result.
 - The marks obtained by the students in the IA test and home assignment are forwarded to the University.
 - The students with poor performance in the IA test are given special care to improve their further study.
 - With a view to encourage independent learning, students are assigned project works and they are sent to field work, industry visits and study tour.
 - Special classes are conducted in the Language Lab to improve communication skills of students.
 - The associations of various departments conduct seminars, workshops and special lectures to which experts are invited to train the students.
 - In national/state-level workshops organized by the college a competitive session is exclusively arranged for students and the students of our college actively participate in it.



2.5.6 What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Reading, writing, arithmetic skills are reasonably improved at the under graduate level. The values like discipline, punctuality etc. are imparted to the students through the classroom teaching and extra curricular activities. They are equipped for their future career with the orientation, training in communication skills and other soft skills.

Besides the above, the graduate attributes are also fulfilled by the students by the following criteria fixed by the university:

- Students are required to have minimum 75% attendance to their classes/practical.
- They are required to take two internal tests and write one assignment per subject in a semester
- They are required to score minimum 40 marks to pass in a subject.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

- At the college level there is an examination committee which sets certain norms for the evaluation. Accordingly the evaluation related grievances are settled at the level of concerned teachers.
- At the University level, students have the provision to apply for retotalling of the marks, photocopies of their answerscript and revaluation of the semester end examination answerscripts.



- 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?
 - The college organises a career guidance program.
 - Placement cell The Placement Cell facilitates the interaction of prospective employers and students, by arranging campus interviews and placements.
 - The Entrepreneurship Development Cell conducts workshops for final year students which helps them to become entrepreneurs.
 - The institution has an MOU with 'e-Goal' which conducts training for competitive exams and computer courses. It helped the students to face competitive examinations.



- An Under Graduate Research Center (UGRC) has come-up on the college campus which helps the students to involve in the research activities.
- Digital Language Lab facilitates learning communication skills.
- There are manuscripts magazines like 'BLOOM', 'PHOTON', 'DEEPIKA' to which students contribute their articales. There is also an annual magazine of the college 'SHARAVATI' wherein students' articles are published; it also contains the reports of the programmes conducted in the college, students and teachers achievements with relavent photos.
- 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?
 - Every department is given responsibility to collect and analyze the data on student performance and learning outcomes.
 - Attendance Committee monitors student's attendance every month.
 - Students' performance is analyzed and discussed in the faculties and Mangement meeting; corrective measures are taken to improve the performance of the students as per the guidance given by the Management.
 - The college has feedback collection system so that the barriers for learning for the students are analyzed and rectified.
 - The Principal of the college conducts regular meetings with the faculty members to discuss students' overall performance and suggests the measures for the improvement.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The Institution monitors the learning outcomes through:

- Continuous assessment and regular student feedback.
- Result analysis ensures the achievement of learning outcomes.
- Placement of the students.
- Felicitating the student achiever in academics and sports.
- Meetings of the staff chaired by the President of the Management in which, students' performance are appraised.



2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, The methodologies used for this purpose are Group Discussion, Assignments, Seminar presentations, individual or Group project work, Viva – voce, and two internal examinations. These evaluation exercises are diagnostic as well as remedial as they:

- Provide effective feedback to students.
- Enable teachers to take account of the results of assessment.
- Help students to face the examinations without fright and can gather thorough understanding of the subject.
- Seminars and assignments have made students better orators.
- Allow the active involvement of students in their self learning.
- There is a noticeable increase in the use of library and internet facilities as most of the activities are reference based.

The institution does not have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University. But, the College has an Under Graduate Research Centre (UGRC) established with the assistance from the Management and other funding agencies to conduct research projects for UG and PG students. The Center works in collaboration with Green Gold Global Research Institute, Muroor, Kumta.

Yes, the college has a research committee to facilitate, monitor and encourage the research activities. The research committee comprises five members from teaching faculty representing various departments and two members from non teaching faculty and the Principal as the Chairman of the committee.

- Well equipped Indoor Stadium provides facilities for indoor games throughout the year.

Support and guidance to the students in preparing for the competitive exams are provided in the following manner;

- The college has subscribed books and magazines like India year book, chronical year books, and competition success review, chronical G. K. and Diksuchi etc. and they are issued to students.
- Chanakya The Economic Forum of our college has organized one day orientation programme on how to prepare for IAS exams by inviting an IAS Officer Dr. Kartik Hegdekatti on 07-10-2014.



- The placement cell of the college in association with E-goal has organized 90 hours package of IBPS and banking exam coaching progremme from 28-08-2015. 70 students of the final year participated.
- On 16-04-216 a young IAS officer Mrs. Divya Prabhu, addressed our students on the occasion of 'Mega Job Fair' organized by the placement cell of our college. She has motivated our students to prepare for IAS right from the begining.

Some of our Management faculties and PG studnets have appeard for NET/SLET examinations and two of the faculties got success in NET examination. UG students appear for State Service, Banking, Railway, LIC examinations every year.

Parents' feedback is taken at the time of 'Parents Meeting' which is conduted every year.

As an employer, the Management of our college arranges staff meeting with the Management twice a year. The president, secretary and other office bearers of the Management discuss curricular, extra-curricular, cocurricular activities and also analyse the semester results of the students and give suggestions to improve the performance and quality of academic and non-academic activities of the institution.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The college encourages students to publish their idea, views and opinion in the college Annual Magazine "SHARAVATI". The Principal of the college constitutes a 'Magazine Committee' headed by chief editor and editorial board. The selected Kannada and English articles of the students on Indian culture, History, Economy, Literature etc. are published.

College has different Associations like The English literary Club, Kannada Sangha and Science Association. The English literary Club and the Kannada Sangha publish the manuscript magazines, "Bloom" and "Dipeeka" respectively, whereas the Science Associatin brings out the printed magazine, "Photon". Science Association conducts different poster making competitions for students. The best wall-papers, posters, prepared by the student are displayed on the notice-board.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the college has a very effective student council, 'Union and Gymkhana'. Class-wise election is conducted to elect the class representatives every year in the beginning of the academic year. The election is conducted on the democratic Principle. Elected class representatives elect the General Secretary, Art-circle Secretary, Indoor games secretary and Out-door grames secretary.



To guide the student council, a separate supervising body is constituted by the Principal every year. The Principal is the president and one of the senior faculties is the Vice President of Union–Gymkhana. Separate faculties are nominated as advisors to Union and Art-circle activities. Physical Director of the college is the head of the Gymkhana activities. Socio-cultural activities are organized by the Union and Art-circle and Sports events by the Gymkhana. The Union & Gymkhana fees are collected from the students at the time of admission; the account of the same is maintained by the accountant of the college, which is subjected to internal and external audit. The amount collected is used as budgetary allocation for Union-Gymkhana activities.

Besides, this, many departments have their own associations represented by the student leaders. Commerce, Science, 'Chanakkya', "Aristotle', Geography Associations, English literary Club, Kannada Sangha, Bio-club, Carbon Society and Admin are actively functioning in our college. In these associations, the senior teacher is the advisor, and students are elected as the president, secretary and treasurer. The nominal amount is collected from the concerned students as a membership fees. The association conducts several competitions, guest lectures and demonstrations which benefit the students.

M.P.E.Society's S.D.M.College of Arts, Science, Commerce, Honavar has created a special niche for itself in the past five decades. The institution has always stood for the cause of humanity. The vision behind establishment of the institution was very philanthropic. The founders of this historical institution wanted the people of this area to have an open access to learning, irrespective of cast, class and religion.

The institution was set-up with mission to impart such knowledge as may be necessary for the all-round development of the personality of the student, there by making them capable of being better employee and at par with the highly competitive job market. The college aims at instilling scientific zeal and developing skilled human resource to meet contemporary challenges. The College facilitates the young adult learners with opportunities to nurture their leadership potential and sensitizes them towards inclusive social concern, human rights, gender and environmental issues. The vision and mission of the



institution reflects the objectives of the national policy for higher education in molding human resources to meet contemporary challenges. The institution strives to shoulder the responsibility of making the nation's dream come true. The institution provides comprehensive education instilled with scientific temper, creating a platform for lifelong learning.

The institution gives due weightage to academic programmes and cocurricular, extra-curricular activities. The academic design is based on enhancing and empowering the knowledge base of the students. The focus is on the recent trends in scientific and cognitive fields. As a part of value addition to the course, the institution offers several add-on courses. The institution's vital motto is to strengthen the inner potential and emotional quotient of the students.

Internal autonoy is given to the departments to organize field visits, industrial visits, vist to historical places, laboratories, botanical gardens, research and ethnical institutes, business firms and to organize guest lectures, workshops, seminars etc. On request from other colleges especially from autonomous colleges, our teaching faculties are deputed to render their service as members of Board of studies / Board of examination. Books and journal recommended by the deprtments are subscribed by the library and are made available to the faculty and students.

6.1.2 What is the role of top Management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The institution is governed by The Malnad Progessive Education Society a registered body. The Management and the Principal ensured that all provisions of University and UGC bylaws, the statues and regulative are observed. The Principal of the college is the head of the institution and he is always there to provide requisite leadership to the system. He is the ex-officio member of the M.P.E.Society. He also convenes meeting of the staff, various other bodies of the institution and performs all such acts as may be necessary to carry out and give effect to the decisions of the said bodies. Importantly the Principal provides academic leadership and in association with various faculties evolve strategies for academic growth. The faculty is actively involved in decision making process. The teachers hold periodic meetings under the banner of teachers association. The recommendations of the conveners of the committees are submitted to the Management through the Principal and the Management arrives at suitable decision for implementation.

The authorities gather information about various aspects of the college through a number of ways. The Management encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision making body. The Malnad Progressive Education Society's Governing Council is its highest decision making body. The college has constituted different committees of teachers which play an important role in planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of institutional functioning.

The personal interaction of the Principal with various stakeholders such as the faculty, the non-teaching staff, the students and the parents play an important role in this. The information available in students feedback forms and self appraisal report of teachers help the authorities to take policy decisions.

The participatory role of the Management encourages and sustains the involvement for the efficient and effective running of the college. The institution has been shortlisted as college with **"Potential for Excellence"** and for the establishment of **"Atal Incubation Centre"**.

The Principal being the head of the institution bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth running of the college. The role of the Principal of the college is multidimensional. As the head of the institution the Principal is responsible for both the academic and administrative functioning of the college. He prepares list of subjects to be placed before the Executive Committee and the Governing Council of the Management after taking the opinions of all the teachers and the students Union and Gymkhana and takes its approval and executes its decisions.

The Principal is also responsible for all correspondence with governing body, Govt. of Karnataka, UGC, the Karnataka University and different stake holders of the college. Various Committees are formed at the college level to take care of the academic and co-curricular activities. The Principal receives reports orally from these committees periodically and in writing at the end of the each academic year.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

Institution adopts democratic procedure to monitor and evaluate policies and plans. The Principal of the college has complete autonomy to govern the institution within the purview of the rules and regulation framed by the



Government, University, UGC and the Management. The Governing Body of M. P. E. Society; the policy making administrative body of the college, delegates its responsibility to the head of the institution, who exercises requisite authority and autonomy of intellect in coordinating the academic and administrative activities of the institution with commitment to planning, reviewing and recognition for quality enhancement.

In the beginning of the academic year the 'Calendar of Events' is prepared by prospectus committee and time table committee. All teaching learning activities are conducted as mentioned in the calendar. The head of the institution nominates various committees. Official notice is issued along with the guidelines defining the rules and responsibilities of the committees. The committees prepare action plans and submit to the principal for approval before organizing the function. The committees carry out the activities and at the end of the academic year the conveners review the performance of the respective committees and submit the report of the work done along with suggestions for improvement to the Head of the Institution. All these activities are evaluated by the IQAC.

The duties and responsibilities of the faculty of the college are conveyed to them by the head of the institution in the scheduled staff meeting. The administrative staff and menial staff are also informed of their role and responsibilities by the Principal.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Management of the college is in constant touch with Head of the Institution and has an excellent raport with the faculty. The Managemet in its periodic meetings with the members of the teaching and non-teaching staff encourages them to express their opinions and give suggestions without any fear or favour for the improvement of the Quality of Service rendered by the institution. All the administrative, academic, infrastructural facilities and cultural and environmental concerns are addressed in such meetings. The responsibilities of the staff are defined and indicated through the Principal. The President / Secretary of the Management meet the faculty individually as and when required to give instructions on the basis of their feedback.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The Management is always encouraging, supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of effectiveness and efficiency of the instituitional processes and in various activities related to the development of the college. The Principal motivates all the staff members to involve themselves actively at all levels of the committees functioning right from the planning to execution.



To facilitate leadership, college promotes the participation of teaching and non-teaching staff in various training programmes organized in the college by inviting eminent resource persons and such programmes conducted by other reputed institutions. The institution has an MoU with CLHRD, Mangalore, Vidya Poshak Dharwad and School of Management Manipal University, Manipal to train the teachers and students.

Students elect their class representatives democratically in the election and secretaries are elected by class representatives. These secretaries are the members of Union and Gymkhana of the college and they contribute to the decision making. The NCC, NSS, Red Cross and Rover Scouts, various departmental associations groom the qualities of leadership among the students.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

A decentralized functioning mechanism which the institution has evolved empowers the departments and individual faculty with a high level of flexibility.

The head of the institution has decentralized the administration by forming various committees and by taking regular feedback from these committees. Plan and execution is modified in tune with the changing circumstances. The head of each department has the autonomy to allocate subjects of study and distribute the workload among their colleagues.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the institution believes in decentralized governance. It involves all its functionaries in planning and execution and promotes a culture of participative management.

The management acts as a catalyst by delegating power and responsibility at various levels, it promotes a tradition of cooperation and participation. The institution adopts quality management strategies in all academic and administrative aspects.

Head of the institution delegates the responsibility to the Student Welfare officer who is expected to attend to all the grievances of the students both curricular and extracurricular activities and work in perfect co-ordination with the administrative staff and the Principal.

In accelerating the leadership potential, promoting team spirit and ensuring participation of the students, the College Union and Gymkhana plays an active role and involves itself in various programmes and activities representing the aspiration of the student community. The



institution encourages faculty to take leadership of various academic and cultural programmes as conveners of committees and department associations. The institution involves IQAC in the quality enhancement measures of the institution. IQAC formulates implements and monitors sustainable progress. The Alumni association assumes a participatory and contributory role in the development process.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the institution has constituted IQAC which has the president of the M. P. E. Society as its president and the Principal as the chairman, guide to frame the quality policy.

- The IQAC, function under its President, Chariman, Co-ordinator and Secretary and Senior faculty members and few senior members of the Management, student representatives and parent representatives.
- The IQAC meets once in a month to chart out the plan of action and also to review the follow up action.
- Quality policy is reviewed from time to time so that it adheres to the vision and mission statement of the institution.
- The Principal ensures that the Management holds formal and informal dialogues with the staff from time to time to redress any grievances.
- In the academic sphere, teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, refresher courses and orientation programs to update their knowledge and skill base. They are also motivated to organize seminars, workshops, and orientation programmes which ensure a quality interactions among all the stake holders.

Yes. The institution has perspective plan for development. The need of the student, feasibility and sustainability are the aspects considered for the inclusion on the plan.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.


The Governing Council of the Malnad Progressive Education Society is the highest policy decision making administrative body of the college. It consists of 33 members including Chairman and Secretary, Joint Secretary, Treasurer, Teachers representative with the Principal as its ex-officio member. There are 18 subject department headed by the senior most faculty members of the respective department. Two P. G. Departments M.Com and M.Sc is headed by co-ordinators nominated by the Principal with the approval of the Management.



The administrative staff consists of FDA, SDAs (permanent) three computer operators, one accountant (temporary) headed by the senior most among them as the superintendent. The library has qualified librarian, an assistant librarian and a computer operator / clerk and attenders. The sports department is headed by a Physical Education Director.

Different Committees, academic advisors and other formal arrangements made would supplement and compliment the academic and administrative functioning of the college. The functioning of these committees is accountable to the Principal and the Management.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following Teaching & Learning

The institution has framed various strategies which enhance the quality improvement. These strategies are framed by the college, keeping in view of quality changes required for the overall development of the students.



The rules and regulations set by the affiliating University and the State government is strictly followed for student's admission.

Staff members prepare a unit plan at the beginning of every semester. This plan is based on the teaching days available for class instructions. The syllabus covered by each faculty is reviewed by the head of the department at the end of every month. The Principal reviews the unit plan and syllabus completion along with the attendance of the students. Staff members are encouraged to make use of ICT facility for making teaching learning process more effective. Apart from the chalk and talk method, group discussions, field studies, debates, tutorials, student seminars, study tours etc are encouraged. The college has well experienced and highly qualified faculty. The faculty members participate actively in academic programmes.

The library is fully computarised. Internet facility is made easily accessible to students. The library also procures latest text books, reference books, journals, magazines and periodicals.

The answers to important questions are discussed at the end of every test in the respective classes. The Management ensures effective and efficient transaction of the teaching learning process by recruiting the necessary teaching faculty. The teachers are encouraged to enrich their knowledge through active participation in seminars, refresher courses, orientation programmes etc. The college follows the self appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty, which is used for taking up corrective measures.

Research & Development

- The college has established a research cell to promote research aptitude among faculty and students. The staff members are encouraged to submit research proposals to funding agencies. The staff members present research papers in state, national and international seminars and conferences and publish articles in reputed journals. Several members of the staff are engaged in minor research projects.
- The College has established an Under Graduate Research Center at the cost of 50 Lakh a special grant given by TheDepartment of Higher Education, Government of Karnataka in the year 2012. Students of Science department under the guidance of the faculty members and Dr.S.P.Hegde who is nominated by the Management as Scientific Advisor, undertake research project.
- Students are also motivated to take part in the research work. Students of Botany and Zoology are involved in the preparation of 'People's Biodiversity Register of Grama Panchayats of Honavar taluk which is funded by Karnataka Biodiversity Board.



- One student received student research scholarship (INSPIRE)
- Students have presented research papers in National seminars.
- In all the seminars and workshops organized by the Institution, a separate session is arranged exclusively for the students.

Community engagement

To ensure community involvement, the college has various programmes like N.C.C, NSS, Red Cross, Ranger and Rovers etc. The college encourages students to take part in all extension activities. Through these programmes students take part in community oriented activities like social work, Blood donation, health hygiene awareness, medical camps, AIDS awareness, Environmental awareness, Tree plantations and clean India mission.

Human resource management

We have a very active Career Guidance Cell/Placement Cell managed by a Career Guidance Officer and Placement Officer. The cells provide comprehensive quality programmes and resources for preparing the students to meet the challenges in the job market in a globalised era. We have a very efficient mechanism for accessing adequate man power requirement, staff recruitment, monitoring and planning professional development programmes, faculty and student development and obtaining feedback. The student's progression is also monitored continuously. The college supports faculties to join national and international professional organizations.

Industry interaction

College placement cell identifies employment opportunities by collaborating with industries and corporates. It invites experts from industries to train the students. Industrial visits are organized to provide exposer to manufacturing process and industries. The college also invites corporate people to interact with staff and the students. Campus recruitment is a strategy for strengthening relation with industry and corporate world.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal convenes meeting of various committees regularly and obtain feed back. Feedback is submitted to the top Management for necessary action. The activities of the academic year are recorded in the annual report. Parents and alumni are informed about the activities of the college during the meetings and their visit to the college. The suggestions of the stakeholders are invited and the necessary information collected from parents, students, alumni and staff is handed over to the Management to review the activities of



the institution and the same are discussed in the governing body meetings and necessary action is initiated.

Apart from these traditional methods, important events, news and information for the stakeholders are also published in college website, newspapers and broadcasted in local T.V. channels.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support, involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management and the principal always give due importance to the involvement of staff in framing policies and action plan to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes. Principal conducts regular meetings with the staff. Any suggestions put forward by any staff member during these meetings and personal interactions regarding improvement about teaching, learning, infrastructural facilities, extra and cocurricular activities are seriously considered by Principal and Management. Management encourages staff members to be the officer bearers of various academic and administrative bodies of the university. Principal and the Management also support the staff in organizing programmes other than those which are already planned by the IQAC.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes. The affiliating University makes provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution. Our institution is seriously thinking to have autonomy. As the first step, the college conducted a national seminar on 'Autonomous College Pros and Cons' following which a proposal was prepared after wide consultation with all the stake holders, and the same has been sent to the University for necessary action. The institution has applied for UGC's CPE programme and we are oraly informed by the University Authorities that the proposal was recommended to the UGC for the favourable action. The institution is in the process of acquiring the necessary infrastructure and resources for autonomy.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution has well defined grievance reddressal procedure. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stake holders are being



done. The grievances of stakeholders are addressed by the following committees:

- Women's Grievance reddressal Cell
- Discipline committee
- Anti ragging committee
- Student's Grievance redressal Cell

All the above committees are entrusted with the responsibility to analyse the nature of grievance and to resolve them effectively for the promotion of better stakeholder relationship. In all these processes the Principal and the Management play very constructive role.

- 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?
 - No such instances have occurred.
- 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes.The institution has a clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and the quality of the institutional provisions. The IQAC of the college collects feedback from the students and the suggestions are incorporated. Feedback is collected from outgoing students every year with regard to the relevance of the subject and course, and campus experience. On the basis of the data analysed the management initiates measures for improvement.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institution is putting in continuous efforts to enhance the professional competencies' of the teachers by encouraging them to involve in the regular academic work. Teachers are also engaged in co- curricular and extra curricular activities. Nonteaching staff is rendered need based training for professional development.

- The faculty members are encouraged to attend Refresher Courses / Orientation Programmes and Faculty Development Programmes.
- Encouraging the faculty members to pursue M. Phil., Ph.D. and Post Doctoral Studies.
- The Principal encourages the faculty members to take up Minor and Major Research Projects.
- The Office Superintendent is given the responsibility of training the Office Staff from time to time.



- Non teaching staff is also given training to use recent software which enhances their productivity.
- Faculty members are motivated to research activities and encouraged to publish papers.
- Most of the office staff is appointed and paid by the management.
- Examination section of the Karnataka University, Dharwad provides training for Nonteaching staff from time to time.
- The office of Joint Director of Collegiate Education, Dharwad also train the staff whenever necessary.
- The College provides TA and DA for such training programmes.
- 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The Strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment depend on the mode of governance and its decentralization. The head of the institution while translating the policies of the government, University, UGC and Management also appraises the roles and responsibility to employees. Accordingly employees are trained and motivated to perform the work effectively. The Heads of the Departments and conveners of different cells and committees, Librarian and others are informed well in advance and guided to execute their roles. Teachers enjoy the freedom to adopt the teaching methods as required to improve teaching learning process. All these are done under the supervision of IQAC of the college and the management.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The achievements of the faculty members are monitored and updated in the college records. Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from UGC and Department of Collegiate Education. The assessment of the teacher is done by the student's feedback which in turn indicates the teacher's quality. The identities of the students are not disclosed however final year students are selected in order to maintain appropriateness and tranperancy. Feedback form has a well defined set of questions that help the students to evaluate the teaching capacity based on lecture understanding and define how far the teacher has succeeded in imparting the knowledge. These details are accessible to staff, so as to help them judge their performance. The Principal understands the student's reflections and shares it collectively and individually across the staff. If there are any issues of concern, the faculty member is facilitated to overcome the lacuna without lowering self esteem. The management is also involved in this process. The participation of the teacher in various college affairs is closely monitored by the Principal.



Parents meet and the personal interaction of the parents with the academic advisors also helps in the appraisal of the performance of the teaching learning process.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The management always plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the staff. Management keeps a keen vigil on the working behavior of the members of the teaching and nonteaching faculty. Annual increments and placements in the grades are all implemented only after the performance appraisal of the management committee. The management after the appraisal of the faculty takes no time in implementing the benefits due to the staff. The Management takes effective decisions and provides the appraisal details to appropriate stake holders by incorporating the decisions in the proceedings of the meeting of the management committee.

- 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?
 - All the welfare schemes provided by the government to the aided colleges are available to our teaching and nonteaching staff also.
 - All the staff members are insured by Group Insurance Scheme and management appointed staff is given Provident fund facility.
- 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The institution, as it maintains a reputation of providing an excellent work culture and educational ethics of high standard, has successfully attracted meritorious candidates to serve the institution by paying attractive salaries to its employees.Provident fund facility is also provided by the Manaagement. Employees are felicitated on their achievements. Additional increments for M.Phil and Ph.D degree are given. Termination ratio of employees is zero.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

To monitor effective utilization of financial resourses the institution has computerized all its financial management. Students pay their development fees at the Management office directly and University and Government specified fees are paid at the college office. Fees collected by the Management and the College are kept in the bank separately. Financial assistance received from the UGC is maintained in the Canara Bank, Honavar Branch. Funds collected by the



Management are utilized for paying the salary of Management appointed staff and for the development of infrastructure facilities. Fees collected by the college are utilized as per the guidelines of University, the Government and the Management. Prinicpal being the head of the institution is fully authorized and accountable for the utilization of these funds. To ensure the transperancy the Principal forms the following committee;

- UGC fund monitoring committee.
- Library committee.
- IQAC committee.

The above committees are empowered to look into to the proper monitoring and utilization of the financial resources.

No major audit objections were reported. However minor corrections were noticed and resolved.

 - 3. To develop academic and administrative quality of the college.



- 4. To chanalise the activities of the various committees and cells.
- 5. To initiate and monitor the seminars/ conferences and workshops.
- 6. To prepare the 'Annual quality Assurance Report' for NAAC.
- 7. To improve the infrastructural facilities in the college.

Yes, an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities planned at the beginning of the academic year by IQAC. The principal being the academic and administrative head holds discussion with the Heads of the Departments, conveners and office staff to finalise the parameters for quality assurance. All the committees are giving functional autonomy to formulate their own strategies for quality enhancement. The ICT and MIS facilities are freely available for all the students and encouraged to make the best use of such facilities for project works, seminars and other academic related activities. The use advanced teaching aids, optimum use of ICT in office, Library and classroom; updated equipments in laboratories, timely assessment and evaluation, prompt service of office, encouragement for co-curricular and extra curricular activities are some of the essentials of integrated framework. The IQAC monitor the activities of these units and contribute quality assurance.

Yes. All the teaching and non teaching staff is involved in the functioning of the various internal quality assuring bodies. They are trained for meticulous functioning to reach the destined goals. The faculty members are encouraged to attend Refresher Courses / Orientation Programmes and Faculty development



Programmes. The Office Superintendent is given the responsibility of training the office Staff from time to time. Non teaching staff is also given training to use recent software which enhances their productivity.

Yes. The institution undertakes the academic audits by regular assessment and evaluation. Frequent academic counseling is also held to improve the institutional academic activities. The auditing is done using the following methods.

The University every year sends LIC consists of experts to conduct academic audit. The team visits the college and very minutely observes the working of the institution in all its aspects. The committee then comments on the performance and thereby suggests the important changes required. Similarly the other forms of audit come in the form of team visiting the institution as and when any new course is introduced. The college undergoes a review process by the University once in Five years in order to get its permanent affiliation renewed. The college very honestly adheres to the recommendations made by the committees.

The external regulatory authority is the affiliating university, Karnatak University and the institution makes the compliances as per the needs and requirements.

- Shortage of attendance and performance in tests are regularly communicated to the parents.
- Feedback on teaching is taken from student's annually and concerned committee review the feedback given by students and plans strategy for improvement.
- Parent, Academic Advisors and Student interactions indirectly review the teaching learning process.
- The meeting between the Management and teachers also review the teaching learning process.

 - Regular meetings of the Union Gymkhana Advisory Council comprising of elected student leaders, class representatives give suggestions and plan creative and innovative programme every year.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, Institution conducts green audit of its campus and facilities. College is housed on 50 acres of land surrounded by natural forest and plantation with different plants and trees. Two botanical gardens are developed and maintained with the specimen required for regular practical and some medicinal plants in front of Administrative Block of the college. Under the leadership of NCC and NSS wings of the college, the following environment friendly programmes are conducted.

- **Campus cleaning programme**: To ensure cleanliness, campus cleaning programme is undertaken periodically. Both staff and students involve in the campus cleaning programme. Dust bins are kept in every class rooms, students and staff are motivated to put the waste in the dust bins only. Sale of chocolates in the Students Co-operative Society is banned and waste collected is disposed through town municipality.
- Tobacco free campus: College campus is made cent percent tobacco free zone. Sale and use of tobacco products within the radius of 100 mtrs of the campus both by staff and students is prohibited.
- Anti-plastic use campaign: To make the college eco friendly, every effort is made to avoid use of plastic products in the college campus. Use of plastic papers, cups, plates and bags are discouraged in the campus including College canteen and Students Co operative Society.
- **Sound Free Zone:** To avoid sound pollution in the campus, use of horn by the vehicle drivers is prohibited.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

The following initiatives have been taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly:

• Energy Conservation

For conservation of energy the following measures have been taken by the college.



- The College building houses spacious rooms with broad glass windows and ventilators, sufficient natural light and fresh air is available.
- > Natural light and air in the place of electric light is extensively encouraged however; fans and lights are judiciously used in the campus.
- In tune with the Government policy of Energy Conservation, college is using CFL and LED bulbs.
- "Save Energy" warning notices are affixed near the switch boards for creating energy saving awareness among the staff and students.

• Use of Renewable energy

Solar water heaters are used in the ladies hostel as a source of renewable energy.

Water-Harvesting

College has a open well and natural ponds at different conducive places on the campus to store the rain water and meet the water requirements partially. It helps in ground water recharging. The rain water is channelized towards open wells and natural ponds to raise the ground water level up. Rain Water is made to flow close to the well on the campus so that water table is maintained.

Check Dam Construction

The existing open well helps to enrich the water table.

• Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

Efforts are made to maintain the plants and trees on the surrounding areas of the college which help to neutralize the carbon in the premises. Few varieties of indoor flowering plants and medicinal plants are grown in the botanical garden maintained in front of Botany and Geography Departments. Members of the staff and students who are using the vehicle are informed to undergo emission test of their vehicles. Highly air polluting and noise polluting vehicles are not allowed inside the campus.

Plantation

NSS and NCC wings of the college organize 'Vanamahotsava' programme every year in collaboration with Forest Department. Plants supplied by the Forest Department are planted and maintained by the NSS volunteers and NCC cadets with the help and cooperation of students of various Clubs and Associations of the college like RED CROSS, ROVER, SCOUTS, WOMEN CELL etc.

Campus has Plants like Cycas Species, Pandanus Species, Euphorbia tirukalli, Agave americana, Anthocephalus cadamba, Eugenia cumini, Peltaphorum pferocarpum, Polyalthia longifolia, Enterolobium saman, Pterocarpus santalinu, Mesua ferrea, Pterocarpus marsupium, Spsthodea Species, Mangifera indica, Artocarpus Spices, Palms, Phyllanthus emblica, Calophyllum, Morinda citrifolia Michelia chamaka etc.



Hazardous Waste Management

For effective management of waste, awareness is created among the students and staff by organizing different programmes and functions. Periodically campus cleaning programme is undertaken by the students under the leadership of NSS and NCC units. Use of plastic products is discouraged and use of tobacco is banned in the college campus. College Management also takes care of Management of hazardous waste of the campus through hired workers. For creating environmental awareness among the students and public, Students Rally, Anti-plastic use campaign, Swachh Bharat programme are organised by our college Students Union in association with NSS and NCC wings.

• E-waste Management

Electronic and electrical goods are put to maximum use. And the minor repairs are set right by the computer staff and the Laboratory assistants. The major repairs are done by the professional technicians who are appointed by the head of the institution on AMC (Annual Maintenance Charge) system. Recurring problems in infrastructural facility are regularly addressed by the Engineer appointed by the Management. Local Municipality is approached to dispose the waste and collected garbage.

- IGNOU study center was started to cater to the needs of such students who could not take admission for regular courses.
- Admissions were given for Certificate Course, Diploma Programme including Bachelor degree programmes through IGNOU study center.
- Karnataka University External Study Center was started in our college premises for the benefit of general public. Every year **300-350** students register for B.A, B.Com, MA, M.Com courses.
- UGC funded Certificate and Diploma add-on courses in Music, Pourohitya and Human Rights foundation course have been offered.
- Faculty members are encouraged to undergo orientation courses, refresher courses, seminars, conferences and workshops and to undertake research and research projects.
- Term-wise teaching plan of the faculty helps the timely completion of the syllabus.
- Internal assessments are done regularly and feedback mechanism is maintained.
- Innovations in Teaching, Learning and Evaluation
 - Institution has Audio Visual Room and well equipped laboratories with computers, internet facility and a smart board.



- Free Internet access facility is provided to the staff and students in the library.
- Special classes, seminars, group discussions and quiz are conducted for the benefit of needy students to perform better in the examination.
- Question banks and book bank facilities are provided to the students.
- UGC sponsored National level seminars and State level work shops were organised by Departments of Commerce, Economics, English, Political Science, Sanskrit and Kannada in various themes. Rest of the departments have sent the proposals to UGC for organising the seminars.
- Department of Chemistry has organised one day work shop with its own resources.
- Department of Commerce and Science have organised seminar competition for commerce and science students on various related topics during March 2016 and prizes were given to the winners of the competition. English Literary Club of the Department of English conducts various competitions for the benefit of English optional students to develop their literary sensibility. All these programmes are sponsored by the faculties of the department.

• Innovations in Research, Consultancy and Extension.

The following are the recent innovations in research, consultancy and extension.

Research:

Establishment of Under Graduate Research Center (UGRC)

In order to create research awareness among the undergraduate students and to encourage them to take up research projects before they complete their graduation Under Graduate Research Centre was established by our esteemed Management. The project was financed by Government of Karnataka and MPE Society. The research centre is the first of its kind in the state which started functioning from **2011**.

The following are the outcome of the research centre.

- The Research Centre is functioning under the supervision of scientific advisor Dr. S.P.Hegde, and faculties of the Chemistry department.
- B.Sc 1st & 3rd semester students have taken up research project worth Rs
 25 lakh funded by Karnataka Knowledge Commission, Bangalore.
- The research centre has created positive impact on students, as a result of this we are noticing increasing trend towards to admission to pure science.
- 'Atal Incubation Center' worth Rs 10 crore project proposal was submitted to Niti Aayoga, New Delhi.

The Academic Advisors system was introduced during 1985 by then Principal DR.N.R Naik . During 1980s annual examination system was in practice and students' performance was not continuously evaluated. Students' strength was increasing year- by- year as ours was the only college to offer higher education in Honavar municipal area. Principal alone could not attend students' problem. Students were careless and were not responsive. Students were in need of proper care and guidance .To overcome this problem and to give personal attention to the students problems, Academic Advisors system was introduced to monitor and guide the students in which each teacher is given the responsibility of monitoring 25-30 students depending upon the strength of the class. A teacher has to maintain cordial relation with the students by giving proper guidance and care. The system has become successful and is kept continued till the date.

Under the Academic Advisors system, each teacher has to monitor 25-30 students. For each class Academic Advisors are nominated depending upon the strength. Teachers are informed to write down the names and roll numbers of the students in their diary. Periodically official meetings are arranged with the concerned students. Grievances of the students are attended in the meeting by the teacher and grievances which could not be attended on the spot, are reported to the Principal for further action. In addition to the pre fixed meetings, teachers are given freedom to meet the students for care and advice.



The needs of each and every student is taken care of by the teacher who keep in touch with the students in connection with their performance, behavior and the problems they face. A meeting for interaction with their parents or guardians is convened as and when required to discuss their performance and grievances. Teacher is in touch with the students continuously for three years in connection with their result analysis, attendance and participation in the various activities.

The Teacher helps the students to identify their strengths and weaknesses and guides them to make the best of their strengths and helps them to overcome the limitation.

Parents meetings are compulsory and hence all the students will have to attend the meeting along with their parents. Signature of the parents and students is taken on the register maintained for the said purposes as a proof of evidence. Rules and regulations of the college, discipline to be maintained, attendance requirement, facilities available in the college, fee concession, scholarship, future plans of the college etc. are discussed in the meeting. Parents and students grievances are attended in the meeting and constructive suggestions are accepted and implemented.
